In the booklet, you'll find readings for each day of the Lenten season, from Ash Wednesday (February 14) through Easter (April 1).

The theme of this year's booklet is Renewal. The booklet will be available at the Welcome Center beginning Sunday, February 11th. There is no cost.

Stories are an integral part of our historical existence and in particular, the Christian experience. The Bible itself is a composite of stories spanning over a period of over 1500 years, filled with prophecy, narrative encounters, personal and poetic messages, all inspired by a Universal God. In



Deuteronomy 11, the children of Israel were commanded to keep God's written commandments and share the word of God with their children so that their days and the days of their children would be multiplied in the land that God gave them. In Mark 5, Jesus delivers a man from a legion of demons and all he asks in return is for the man to go home and share his story about the goodness and mercy of what God had done for him.

I recently sat in our Adult Sunday school class and listened intently as a member shared an experience they encountered with racism during their early formative years. I was amazed at the story and how much courage this person faced. It gave me a greater appreciation for the meaning of her existence, and the gift that she is in the eyes of God and within our church community. As your pastor, I hear countless such stories--people who escaped war, people who overcame tremendous hardships, people who are still struggling with issues--and each story told reminds me of how fortunate I am. Each story makes me feel richer and appreciate how faithful God is.

If you've ever sat in a meeting with me, you'll probably notice that I am frequently exploring ways to integrate connection and dialogue between our senior members and our youth. I think that in churches like ours we have such a wonderfully unique opportunity to share our gifts and resources with the next generation. We have seniors who have overcome so many life challenges, endured many obstacles, and have been favored with long life beyond many friends and relatives. We have a plethora of stories to share and sadly, many of those stories remain embedded in only the confines of our minds. Perhaps we think that the youth today are preoccupied with other things and have no interest in hearing--perhaps we think that our stories don't bear any significance. Well, I strongly beg to differ! I believe that we all have the propensity to bless our future generations with the inspired words of our life stories and especially those stories that proclaim the goodness and mercy of God.

All of this serves as a springboard for a new initiative I would like to introduce to St. Paul entitled "Our Collective Story". In recognition of African American History Month, I am inviting and encouraging the members of St. Paul to share

What stories you might ask? Stories of triumph...stories of defeat...and even stories that perhaps are not yet completed. While this initiative is being launched during African American History Month, it is an invitation for us all. I strongly encourage people of all nationalities and backgrounds to share stories of how you've encountered, experienced and overcome oppression and most importantly how God has been faithful to you during the process! We will be supplying you with a brief outline and guide and can help offer some clarity. (See below) We hope that you will share!

In addition, on Wednesday, February 21st at 11 am and Thursday evening February 22 at 7pm, in lieu of our regularly scheduled Bible studies, we will be hosting two community forums, that will invite the community to come together, share our stories focused on oppression and racial injustice and discuss how our faith in God has helped and can still help in times like these.

I hope that you will give prayerful attention to these and other ways we can together serve in our efforts to spread the good news and be our brother's and sister's keeper. I love you and am praying for you! Please keep the faith!

- * What has your belief taught you?




